1 Medical negligence <b>CC</b>	a A businesswoman conspires with her competitors to keep their prices high.
2 Negligent damage to private property <b>SI</b>	b A careless driver accidentally kills a pedestrian.
3 Negligent misstatements causing financial loss <b>GT</b>	c A doctor mistakenly harms a patient by giving the wrong treatment.
4 Assault <b>agression EF</b>	d A (drunk) driver crashes after driving above the speed limit.
5 Battery <b>Dispute FE</b>	e A hooligan physically attacks and injures a victim.
6 Trespass <b>R S</b>	f A hooligan throws a brick at a victim, but misses.
7 Fraudulent misrepresentation <b>TM</b>	g A lawyer causes financial harm to his client by giving faulty advice.
8 Interference in contractual relations <b>K K</b>	h A manufacturer makes and sells food which contains harmful ingredients.
9 Unfair business practices <b>AA</b>	i A motorist drives too close to another car and scratches the side.
10 Wrongful death <b>BB</b>	j A party damages another's reputation by writing or saying untrue statements.
11 Fraud <b>P P</b>	k A party disrupts another party's ability to perform contractual obligations.
12 Conversion <b>R R</b>	l A party threatens to harm a victim at an unspecified time in the future.
13 Defamation <b>J J</b>	m A party tricks another party into signing a harmful contract.
14 Reckless driving <b>D D</b>	n A party wears a disguise in order to trick a victim into believing he is someone else.
15 Professional negligence <b>G</b>	o A property owner irritates her neighbours by burning rubber tyres in the garden.
16 Nuisance <b>O O</b>	p A saleswoman takes deposits from customers who want holiday homes, but the homes don't actually exist.
17 False imprisonment <b>Q</b>	q A shop manager wrongly accuses a customer of theft, and locks her in his office for an hour.
18 Intentional infliction of emotional distress <b>L</b>	r A thief takes and uses another person's property as his own.
19 Product liability <b>H</b>	s A walker crosses a farmer's land and damages his crops.
20 Deceit <b>N</b>	t An estate agent mistakenly tells a client that a property is structurally sound, but hasn't actually checked.
